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# New York School for the Deaf, Then and Today

New York School for the Deaf (Fanwood) is the oldest school for the Deaf in New York State and the second oldest in the country. Our School, is unique in so many ways and so steeped in history and the hearts of our community.



In 1817, our School opened in a small building near City Hall in downtown Manhattan. We later moved to a more spacious location near 49th Street and Fifth Avenue, current site of Saks Fifth Avenue. Once again, we needed more space and relocated to Washington Heights, the current home of Columbia Presbyterian Hospital. It was then that NYSD also adopted the nickname of Fanwood. We moved to White Plains in 1937 where we continue to provide excellence in education to our Deaf students.



We are proud that our graduates over the past 200+ years have gone on to make names for themselves in many fields - science, education, business, the arts and more. We continue to stand by our original vision of NYSD fostering a bilingual environment in both English and American Sign Language, which ensures a safety net for students to achieve the success they deserve.



# From the Desk of the Superintendent

I joined the Fanwood campus in 2022 as its newest Superintendent. I did so with joy and a strong sense of responsibility. We have a beautiful campus and incredible students. This is a community I am proud and humbled to be responsible for.

I grew up in New York as a child from a Puerto Rican and Lebanese family and attended mainstream programs. While I was successful academically, I always felt there was more. I discovered ASL and the Deaf community. I found support and people who understood my experiences. # We're Open For Enrollment.

#### **Q**: Who can attend NYSD?

**A**: In order to be eligible to attend NYSD, a student must have a documented hearing loss, and be between the ages of 0 to 21 years.

#### **Q** : Do parents pay tuition?

A : New York School for the Deaf serves students at <u>no cost</u> to their families.

#### Q: How are students referred to NYSD?

A: Parents/Guardians may either apply directly to the school for admissions consideration for their child OR the respective school district may submit a referral on behalf of a child.

### **Board President: Alexis Kashar**



Alexis Kashar is a Civil Rights attorney. She is a business leader, entrepreneur and technologist. She grew up in a multi-generational Deaf family that encouraged her interest in civil rights and accessibility from an early age. For over two decades, Alexis practiced civil rights and special education law in the private sector with a focus on accessibility. As a civil rights advocate, Alexis Kashar dedicated her career as a force for creating access and implementing monumental change. In the course of her work she has been appointed to the Architectural and **Transportation Barriers Compliance Access Board by** President Biden.

In her role as Board President, Alexis Kashar has overseen many changes and improvements to the School, We are so fortunate to have her because in addition to her advocacy in the community, she is an outstanding role model for young Deaf people who dream of pushing back barriers and fully actualizing their dreams. # **Being Bilingual: The Fanwood Model**

In the 1830's, when the New York School for the Deaf was still in its infancy, its teachers gathered to discuss the best means of educating Deaf people. After much deliberation, they concluded that the best means to provide a well rounded education would be through direct instruction using American Sign Language (ASL), English, Mathematics, and in fact, any subject area. Direct instruction in ASL then became the cornerstone and continues to be the Fanwood model. Our Board member, Tom Humphries, has researched extensively in this area and concludes: "[Researchers] found that ASL proficiency, on the other hand, correlated most highly with reading achievement. Specifically, they found two factors correlated with reading achievement: ASL fluency and exposure to print... Deaf students who have developed ASL proficiency have a significantly better chance of attaining English literacy." From 1830 to today, our model is tested and true.

Over the years, technology has changed and developed to help Deaf people access sound, i.e., ear horns, hearing aids, and cochlear implants. It has been proven that the addition of American Sign Language to complement those technologies is beneficial. This visual, fully accessible language of ASL provides a comprehensive safety net, enabling students to engage with the content they are provided.

Dr. Humphries notes this is especially true for students from multilingual families. "The diversity of deaf students suggests the appropriateness of dual and multi-language strategies rather than monolingual ones."

Equally as important is access to a pool of peers with similar experiences. A Deaf child alone, regardless of speaking or hearing ability, often experiences bullying or differential treatment by teachers and classmates. The support of Deaf peers, their advice, and the benefit of their shared experiences is invaluable. Humphries explains: "Historically, deaf children were kept separate from each other and taught in differing ways, denying the critical mass of deaf children rich social interaction and social learning." **Ensuring peer groups and access to Deaf community members and leaders are additional cornerstones of our model.** 

Children need role models to thrive. Having access to successful Deaf adults who function as high level bilinguals and role models makes an unbelievable difference for all students who come to our school. Humphries points out that in programs like ours, "the emphasis is on the teacher as a model of language, speech, and learning." **At the New York School for the Deaf, our students experience Deaf role models leading our schools, teaching our classes, and more.** Thanks to the work of Dr. Humphries and others, we know we need to continue to provide access to Deaf leaders in all fields as well as enable them to develop networks for their future success.






#### **Student Demographics**

#### **Celebrating Multiple Differences**








Our diverse families speak diverse languages at home. Every year at NYSD, we see a new language profile for our community.




